


Brief history of FTNCG



Registered Charity No. 1157957

- Inaugural meeting at Whitegates on 1st February 2011
- Became charity (1157957) in July 2014 to: "promote for the benefit of the public the conservation, protection and improvement of the physical and natural environment in and around Forest Town"
- In 2014, with support from Forest Town Community Council and the community of Forest Town, FTNCG purchased Spa Ponds for the benefit of all, transferring deeds to Official Custodian for Charities
- 2017 Spa Ponds Heritage Project: Celebrating 700 years of history

 Associated with peel (fence) around Clipstone Park, and may have been known as 'Peel Water'

The name 'Peel Water' appears on the Sherwood Forest Map, also known as the 'Belvoir Map', of circa 1334, as depicted below:






Figure 2. Detail from the 'Belvoir Map' showing 'Peel Water'

- Evidence suggesting order to create fish ponds made during Great Famine, which began in 1315, due to embarrassing incident – King Edward II ran out of food at King's Houses in Clipstone during Christmas of 1315.
- 1317 likely year for creation of Medieval fish ponds, although the ponds have been substantially altered since 14th century.



Some trees (sweet chestnut) more than 400 years old

- Royal ownership from 1100's to 1603, then sold to Earl of Shrewsbury & Mary Cavendish
- Decimated during English Civil War (mid-1600's)
- Reclaimed by Cavendish family in 1660 and restocked
- 4th Duke of Portland's flood dykes (from 1800's)



- 6th Duke of Portland died in 1943, and in 1945 tenant farmer Edmund Shaw Browne bought Spa Ponds as part of sale of Duke's estate.
- Remained in Shaw Browne family's possession until bought by FTNCG in 2014.
- Spa Ponds has gone full circle, from communal ownership to Royal and aristocratic ownership and eventually back to the community, who are committed to enhancing the site's biodiversity whilst honouring its heritage.




